A reading from the Gospel according to Mark 11: 1-11.

When they were approaching Jerusalem, at Bethphage and Bethany, near the Mount of Olives, Jesus sent two of his disciples and said to them, "Go into the village ahead of you, and immediately as you enter it, you will find tied there a colt that has never been ridden; untie it and bring it. If anyone says to you, 'Why are you doing this?' just say this, 'The Lord needs it and will send it back here immediately.'" They went away and found a colt tied near a door, outside in the street. As they were untying it, some of the bystanders said to them, "What are you doing, untying the colt?" They told them what Jesus had said; and they allowed them to take it. Then they brought the colt to Jesus and threw their cloaks on it; and he sat on it. Many people spread their cloaks on the road, and others spread leafy branches that they had cut in the fields. Then those who went ahead and those who followed were shouting, Then he entered Jerusalem and went into the temple; and when he had looked around at everything, as it was already late, he went out to Bethany with the twelve.



John Newton, the famous composer of *Amazing Grace!* wrote many hymns, 61 of which are still in use. One of the crudest of sailors, a slave trader Captain, he nearly perished in a storm at sea. During the turbulence, His early childhood memories of his Christian mother caused him to cling to the Bible and plead with the Lord Jesus for his life. After this dramatic encounter, he followed his Savior completely, becoming a Rector in the church of England. He continued preaching until he was 80 years old. This text is believed to be a recounting of His salvation experience.

In evil long I took delight, Unmoved by guilt and shame, Until a scene came into sight, A scene of love and pain. I saw One hanging on a tree, In agony and blood; Who fixed His weary eyes on me, As near His cross I stood.

Surly never to my latest breath, Can I forget that look! It seemed to charge me with His death, Though not a word He spoke. My spirit fell; I groaned within and sank into despair; He bled and suffered for my sins, I helped to nail Him there!

Alas! I knew not what I did, but now my tears are vain. Where shall my trembling soul be hid: For I the Lord have slain. A second look He gave, which said, "Your sins I do forgive; This blood is for thy ransom paid; I die that thou mayest live."

So while His death my sin displays In all its blackest hue, Such is the mystery of grace, It seals my pardon too! With pleasing grief and sad delight, My spirit now is free. For Jesus gave His perfect life To save a wretch like me.
